Option I

Straight into study on an Undergraduate course at university.

Option 2

A gap year, prior to studying on an Undergraduate course at university.

Students planning on a gap year should still apply for university whilst in the sixth form but select 'deferred entry'.



- Gap years can be a very positive thing provided they are used effectively to gain more knowledge, experience or travel.
- Students planning a gap year are actively encouraged to have a plan of study lined up for after the gap year.

Any student planning to go to university must take the following steps:

- I. Decide WHAT to study
- 2. Decide WHERE to study
- 3. Complete their UCAS application online, including their personal statement.
- 4. Some universities and courses may also require:
 - Aptitude Assessments
 - Submit essays
 - Interview/MMI



I. Decide WHAT to study

- Many students already have a specific career path in mind.
- Many students know a general area of study.
- Some students don't know where to start!

3. Completing UCAS Application

- UCAS stands for 'University and College Admissions Service.
- Towards the end of this month, Year 12 students will set up their 'UCASTrack'
- Much of the application is straight forward to complete.
- Students can apply for 5 universities/courses.
- Students must write a 4000 character 'Personal Statement' and this is an extremely important part of the application.
- Students gain guidance on writing their Personal Statement later this month.
- There is a fee of £28.95



The UCAS Personal Statement is changing this

year...

The statement is still 4000 characters.

However, it is now broken into 3 'sub-questions' (students can flex how much they include in each option).

- Why do you want to study this course/subject?
- How have your qualifications and studies helped to prepare you for this course or subject?
- What else have you done to prepare outside of education & why are these experiences useful?

There is no longer a line count (as was previously a requirement). Centres will still read the whole statement (not just one section).

UCAS Personal Statement

- Competitive universities/courses <u>actively discourage</u> irrelevant extra curricular and enrichment information from Personal Statements
- Students need to have lots of subject specific content: Supercurricular
 - Background reading
 - Additional lectures/TED Talks
 - Work Experience
 - Relevant hobbies/projects/portfolios
- Last year we set up a super-curricular programme in school to provide more structure for students.
- Students to work on their personal statement with their mentor.
 May take up to 6, 7, 8+ drafts to get to the finished article.
- Students need to be proactive!

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UCAS – Personal Statement

What can/should students be doing now?

- Researching courses that they are interested in
- Using this to think about 'why' they would want to study this course.

Similarity Detection

- Personal statements are checked against a library of those already in the system, and from a variety of websites and paper publications.
- Each new statement is added to the library after processing.

Make sure that your personal statement is your own work

We will carry out checks to verify that your personal statement is your own work. If your personal statement appears to have been copied from another source we will inform the universities and colleges to which you have applied. They will then take the action they consider appropriate. We will also contact you by email.

3. Completing UCAS Application

- Once the student has completed their part of the UCAS
- Application...
- The mentor will write a UCAS Reference (checked by a member of the sixth form team).
- Add Predicted UCAS Grades (PUGs). These are subject teachers' best estimates of what grade each student will achieve in their subject.
- PUGs will be based on Assessments, the end of YI2 Exams.

3. Completing UCAS Application

- Those applying to Oxford or Cambridge, or for Medicine, Dentistry and Vet Science Courses have a UCAS deadline of 15th October 2025. UCAS
- School deadline is I week before this.
- UCAS closes for applications on January 14th 2026.
- All students applying to university should have their UCAS forms completed by the end of November 2025.
- As a Sixth Form we aim to have applications sent off within 2 weeks of when the student has completed their part.



4. After Submitting UCAS Application

- Many universities choose to make an offer (or reject an applicant) based on the information in the application.
 Students are informed about through 'UCAS Track'
- Some universities/courses require interviews. Some are quite academic and rigorous (e.g. MDV/Oxbridge/ Physiotherapy), others are more informal. Interview support provided in school.
- Some courses may require a portfolio of work i.e. architecture, arts etc.



- Students can only apply to either Oxford OR Cambridge, not both.
- Many courses require students to complete an aptitude test.
 E.g. PAT, GAT, ELAT, MAT etc. Completed in school in early November.
 Students not given their results. Support in subject areas for these assessments.
- Some subjects require essays to be submitted.
- Interviews during December. Sometimes a good amount of notice given, at times only told a few days in advance. Multiple mock interviews held in school to help prepare.
- Offers usually made mid-January.



- Students can only apply to 4 MDV courses.
- 5th choice should be related: Biomedical Science, Dental Technician.
- Medicine courses require completion of the UCAT. We provide support for this in school.
- Interviews usually between December and February. Many interviews are 'MMI'. Significant preparation for these in school.
- Offers usually made mid-January to late-March.



Other information to be aware of:

- Some universities offer to reduce their entry requirement if:
 - Students put them as their first choice.
 - Students offer a strong grade in their EPQ
 - Students fulfil certain socio-economic criteria

(i.e. first generation to go to university, certain postcodes)

- Some universities make unconditional offers, however the 'Fair admissions code of practice' (2022) states that universities "should avoid applying pressure through their offer making practices, including by avoiding the use of 'conditional unconditional' offers, restricting the use of unconditional offers to specific circumstances, and using incentives appropriately and transparently.



We of course hope that all students achieve the grades needed for their first-choice university, or if not their insurance choice. Every year there are a small number of students who don't get the grades they need though. If this occurs the following options are available:

- On A level results day apply for a priority paper review.
- Find a university place through Clearing Plus.
- Delay going to university for a year. Re-apply the following year (still with the support of Urmston Grammar), completing some re-sits if necessary.

- The average debt among the cohort of borrowers who finished their courses in 2024 was £48,470
- The Government expected that before its 2022 reforms only 25% of current full-time undergraduates who took out loans would repay them in full. They forecast that after the reforms this would increase to more than half among new students from 2024/25.
- While the exact amount varies, research suggests that graduates can earn approximately a third more than non-graduates ten years after graduation. The earnings gap continues to grow as careers progress, with graduates potentially earning 37-38% more by age 31.



Repayment Plan 5

For any student not starting undergraduate university course they will be on the new **'repayment plan 5'** (started August 2023). This means students will pay 9% of their income over the new lower repayment threshold of £25,000 a year, £2,083 a month or £480 a week in the UK.

This means you'll start paying your loan back at a lower level and monthly payments will be higher at every level.

Any loan plus interest remaining still unpaid 40 years after graduating is written off.


